

HISTORIC MILTON



Milton is the perfect short-break destination, ideal for a romantic interlude or a family getaway. It is only a 3 hour scenic drive from Sydney and around 2 ½ hours from Canberra and, having just celebrate its 150th anniversary, this historic village is loaded with atmosphere.



It boasts art galleries and antique vendors, alfresco cafes and fine-dining restaurants, sophisticated fashion boutiques and contemporary homewares stores.



Surrounded by the rural pastures of working dairy farms and overlooked by the iconic Pidgeon House Mountain in the Budawang ranges, the village is just a few kilometres from some of the world's most beautiful white sand beaches, coastal lakes, inlets and rivers.



Nearby wineries include Cupitt's Winery where one can taste award winning wine, made the traditional way in an underground wine cave, or enjoy a magnificent meal at the Vineyard Kitchen where seasonal food with French influence is created using only the freshest local produce.

Bushwalking, golf and surfing are just some of the sporting activities that are on offer. Whale watching (especially popular in the winter months as the whales migrate north, or in spring as they return to the south with calves in tow) and fishing charters are available from nearby Ulladulla harbour.



Craft and produce markets are held in Milton on the first Saturday of every month and, throughout the year, there are several annual events such as the Agricultural Show in Feb/Mar, the Scarecrow Festival in the June long weekend, Escape ArtFest in Sep/Oct which showcases art, music, poetry, theatre, dance and film, and the Milton Settlers Fair over the October long weekend.



Dedicated foodies are in heaven with a number of superb restaurants in the area including Rick Stein at Bannisters in Mollymook; Topsy Fig, Bacchus at Milton, renowned vegetarian restaurant, Pilgrims, exquisite cafe and patisserie, Coastal Indulgence, and newly opened St Isadore in Milton itself; or Millard's Cottage in Ulladulla, to name a few.
